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Background: St. Nicholas PCC has the responsibility of co-operation with the Revd. Jonty Frith, Incumbent, in promoting our Mission Statement that "We are a church focused on Jesus so that we love one another, serve the whole parish and touch the world."

Charitable Status: The Parochial Church Council is a corporate body established by the Church of England. The PCC is a charity exempted from registration with the Charity Commission. The appointment of PCC members is governed by and set out in the Church representation rules.

Bankers: Current account held with National Westminster Bank, Bath. Deposit and Investment accounts held with the Central Board of Finance of the Church of England (CFB), London.

Independent Examiner: Andrew Morrison

Financial Review: The full financial report is presented separately.

Reserves Policy: It is PCC policy to balance general income and expenditure each year and to invest our fund balances with the CBF Church of England Deposit Fund. The PCC policy is to maintain, if possible, a balance of unrestricted funds equal to six months' unrestricted payments to cover any emergency that may arise.

The PCC has three Charitable Trusts which donate money to the work of St. Nicholas Church, for which the rector and churchwardens act as Trustees:

- The Barlow Trust for the benefit of the sick and poor of the parish.
- The Ramsbottom Trust for the maintenance of the churchyard.
- The Rhodes Trust for Sunday School work in the parish.

PCC Review of the Year:

PCC met formally seven times during 2023. Besides the regular items (including safeguarding and sub-committee reports), the PCC has discussed a variety of matters:

- We approved the appointments of Natalie Mills as Benefice
 Administrator and Rachel Howlett as Children's and Families' Worker.
- We considered how best to use various funds, including the Anne Skipper legacy, the Barlow fund and the Joy Isaac legacy. We agreed bursaries for Lakeview Venture could be paid from the Susan Rhodes fund.
- We discussed issues regarding the Prayers of Love and Faith, writing to Bishop Michael to express concern about these Prayers and support for Jonty Frith.
- We agreed to become a Partner Church of the South West Gospel Partnership.
- We resolved that a simple said service of Evening Prayer from the Book of Common Prayer would be held on at 18:00 on the first Sunday of each month.
- We put the North Aisle pews project on hold, while the heating project was being tackled.
- We heard that Herschel Infrared could install two main (halo) heaters and six horizon heaters, which could cost in excess of £100,000, when combined with the cost of installation.
- We noted the church is operating with significant deficits, which must be resolved soon, and agreed that there should be a separate fund to pay for the heating project.

Finance:

At the end of 2023 income for St Nicholas was under budget, there were 3 legacies and a grant from the Parish Council towards churchyard maintenance. There have been some donations towards the renewal of the church heating system which will carry forward to 2024. Expenses were over budget, these included work on the church heating, work at the vicarage and salaries. The Parish share was higher than the previous year.

Shares to the value of £20,000 have been sold reducing the church reserves.

Churchwardens' Report:

2023 saw the arrival of two new staff members at St Nicholas': Natalie Mills, who is our Benefice Administrator, and Rachel Howlett, our Children's and Families' Minister. Both have made excellent starts — Natalie has been able to build on Hilary's work in updating and reshaping our administration, and we are seeing the benefits of their combined work on Safeguarding. Rachel runs our junior church groups on Sundays and has launched a couple of new initiatives, including an after-school story club and Halloween outreach with hot chocolate for trick-ortreaters in the village. It has been lovely to see a few new families coming to church services.

The size of the problems with our church heating system became apparent in Spring 2023, when what had been assumed to be a one small leak turned out to be a series of leaks in some completely expired pipework, much of which is buried beneath irreplaceable Wombeyan marble in the Australia Chapel. The cost and complexity of repairing/replacing the pipework, along with the Diocese's commitment to reaching net zero and phasing out fossil fuel powered heating, mean that we need a new, all-electric heating system. This new system will probably be based on far-infrared heaters, which heat objects as

opposed to space and therefore use much less energy than a hot water-based system (this reduction in energy usage then counteracts the fact that electricity is more expensive than gas, and so the final energy bill is comparable). A significant amount of work will be required to upgrade our electricity supply and renew the church wiring (which is also beginning to fail), and we anticipate that the total cost will be in the region of £100,000 (this is a similar amount to our annual church budget and so considerable fundraising effort will be required).

We are glad to have been able to meet in the Miller Room during the colder months, and grateful to the children (and junior church volunteers) for coping with the reduced space in the Upper Room while we use 'their' space for services, and to Hilary Crellin for donating the small piano that has made such a difference to our music in the Miller Room.

Rector's Report:

"Encourage one another, and build each other up" 1 Thessalonians 5:11 2023 was a year of consolidation following the major challenges of the last few years. And it came with its own challenges. The need for mutual encouragement has been as great as ever and I thank God for making our church family a place where that mutual encouragement is growing. For the whole of 2023 we had no central heating in the main church building. Moving Sunday gatherings into the Miller Room was hampered by the heating not working there for a time either, but Paul Bryant oversaw a smart move to separate the two systems and enable a warm Miller Room. Services in there have been a joy, and it was good to be able to use the church for the summer. We now face a major challenge to replace the heating system with an environmentally-acceptable alternative, rewire and redecorate the church, which will require significant fundraising. It is taking longer than expected to obtain competitive quotes, but estimates of up to £120,000 have been floated.

The Lord is merciful to us and we have seen some growth in numbers in the Miller Room. Meeting there has displaced Junior Church into the Upper room, which is not really suitable for boisterous youngsters, especially on Sundays that see large numbers, which have been occurring delightfully more frequently.

April 2023 was when Rachel Howlett started as Children's & Families' Minister, soon after Natalie Mills started as Administrator. Both have brought great benefit to the life of the church and offer very good value for money but need to be paid for! Shortage of staff has recently been enabling us to get away with lower giving but we need urgently to raise our financial contributions. In the first few months of 2023, Pippa Dowsett kindly voluntarily helped to tide us over the administrative gap between Hilary Crellin and Natalie. We are most grateful.

A large cohort of a previous generation of St Nicholas' members have in 2023 gone to be with the Lord, and others have moved away. We look back with thankfulness and those who remember miss Peter Lloyd-Williams who for many years was a Reader, David Warboys who was Parish Steward, Ray Book who as an electrician did much of the church's electrical work, Michael Wills a key choir member, and both Mary Woodman and Barbara Davies were close to the heart of the church. It is lovely that Andy, Rita and Ann are still with us but Ralph went before Mary, and Judith Book moved to be near her daughter in Cranbrook. Nigel and Annette (mentioned under Tech and Music respectively) White also moved away and are greatly missed, especially for Nigel's hearty preaching.

Having lost so many, we are blessed to have relatively stable numbers as new people have joined as well. We continue to aim to be a church focused on Jesus, so that we love one another, serve the parish and touch the world.

A faithful focus on Jesus is becoming more and more counter-cultural in the post-Christian West, and this is sadly also the case even within the Church of England. We have much to repent of, including toleration of abuse and prejudice against those from different backgrounds, race, class or sexual orientation. Jesus calls us to love all our neighbours and to scatter the seeds of the Gospel on all kinds of soil. It is Gospel seed that comes from his word, not created or adapted by us. We are all called to deny ourselves, take up our cross and follow Jesus. The recent push by the House of Bishops, narrowly approved by General Synod, to introduce "Prayers of Love and Faith" and affirm people in their lifestyle choices, empties proclamation of the Gospel of its power to save. It embeds a contradiction into the official position of the Church of England by simultaneously asserting that the church's doctrine of marriage is unchanged and implying a radical change. This has led to gridlock in the implementation process, much to everyone's frustration, and revealed and exacerbated deep divisions. Experience shows that in every province where this route has been followed, faithful Christians, ministers and churches have been driven out of the dioceses, which have dwindled. We do not want to spend our time and energy in conflict. It is sapping the church of strength and deflecting us from loving gospel ministry. But if there is to be any faithful gospel ministry within the Church of England in the next generation and beyond, I believe we need legally secure provision of a place for ministers and churches that uphold the faith as we received it. That is not yet in place and so I need to make clear that I am not walking together with our bishop in this. I remain under his legal licence and am fully with the diocesan Safeguarding structure, but have lost confidence in his spiritual leadership and so am receiving new temporary informal alternative spiritual oversight provided by an active retired bishop. PCC is still working out appropriate ways to express our changed relationship with the Diocese and its implications for our financial interdependence.

Meanwhile, the work of the Holy Spirit in building the body of Christ goes

on in Bathampton. Thank you all, brothers and sisters in the church, for encouraging one another and building each other up. It is a refreshing joy to be part of a church family in which the Spirit is working, causing us to grow into the likeness of the Lord Jesus. And he is bringing more people to himself with us. Let us rejoice in that and welcome them.

Deanery Synod:

The topic that came up most in 2023 at Deanery Synod was that of 'Partnerships' between Benefices. Financial pressures at a Diocesan level mean that the Deanery is required to go from the equivalent of 22 full-time, stipendiary vicars to 17. The strategy and criteria for achieving this reduction are set out in the Deanery Plan (for example, priority is given to ministry in areas of socio-economic deprivation). The practical implementation and implications of these partnerships remains somewhat unclear, though the overall aim is to enable sharing of resources between churches such as to strengthen the ministry across the Deanery.

World Mission:

Engaging Children and Youth

Junior Church:

Junior church has a lovely group of leaders and helpers which means that they can have a good balance between being in church and serving. We have had a few new children join us this year, meaning we have 13-15 who come reasonably regularly, though the weekly attendee numbers

can be very variable. We have moved to using Scripture Union Light Live resources and mix the 5-7 and 7-11 resources weekly to have something that is accessible to all ages. The format is usually a game or activity to start, the main part focused on the Bible and then an activity or choice of activities to respond. There is quite an age range so I have been trying to offer something for the older and the younger when appropriate. It is lovely to see the friendship and fellowship growing across the ages as well as the excitement at sharing their faith.

Story Club:

Story Club was relaunched in the summer to a small group of church children and then advertised more widely from September. We currently have ten regular attendees, which works well as a group size at present. We have looked at Old Testament heroes (David, Daniel, Shadrach and Meshach, Abednego), Jesus' parables. This term we are exploring the life of Moses before half term and some of Jesus life as we lead to Easter. In sessions we usually do something like: have a snack, hear the Bible story, sing a worship song and then do some activities based around the story. We are lucky to have a great group of volunteers supporting, I'm very thankful for all they do.

Mini Club:

Upon taking on MiniClub last April there was an initial increase in families, with 7 attending one week, however this didn't last and we were soon back to having one or two families a week. This lack of a "critical mass" then made visitors feel a bit awkward. With the finishing of Maxi/Lunch Club and a number of comments from the families that did attend about being far from grandparents we have decided to try a more inter-generational group.

Bathampton Primary School:

After several meetings with different staff members this year we started to build a relationship up again with the school. I have been asked to help with forest school a few times and after that a few assemblies. Three classes have also come to the church for different parts of their learning about the Christian faith. StoryClub also means that the team are at the school each Tuesday and are able to chat to staff and the head. There has been interest from the school in being involved in a community project with the church, we hope that "The Bridge" will be a group that they are keen to get involved with and we can continue to develop our links.

Support Ministries

Administration:

Many thanks to Pippa Dowsett for all her work in the office during the first part of the year, following the retirement of Hilary Crelin.

In March Natalie Mills was appointed Benefice Administrator. Natalie has used her experience to re-create the invoicing system and to try and streamline all the administrative tasks.

At the end of 2023 we changed over from Vodafone to Yappl and introduced wireless access points in the Miller Room and church which are working well. The phone line is now via VOIP which the landline number 01225 is redirected to Natalie's mobile during workings hours. The printer has also been changed to reduce costs.

It is hoped that 2024 will be a year of consolidation of these changes, as well as on-going work to improve the overall efficiency of the

administrative life of the church. In 2024 Nataile also hopes to create a church contact list – separate to the electoral roll – so that the church family can easily find ways of communicating with others in the church family – especially in times of hardship.

Safeguarding:

There has been a lot of changes in the way that safeguarding has been organised in parishes this year. We now have access to a parish dashboard and hub to highlight to us any work that needs to be done in a traffic light system. The hub also highlights anyone who needs training completed or a new DBS. The diocese has also moved the DBS checking system to 31:8 away from capita. We have 25 people with current DBS checks on our teams working with vulnerable adults and children.

This year we have kept up to date with DBS checks and run two basic and foundation training courses which have been well attended. There is still a bit of a struggle to get everyone to the right level of training but hopefully it will improve next year. The introduction of all PCC members being required to take the Domestic Abuse Awareness course has particularly been difficult as this course is not available in person (only online)

The safeguarding team is made up of myself (as PSO), Natalie Mills (as DBS administrator), Jonty (as incumbent) and Hannah Findlay.

We have only rung for one wedding in the past year, and this was at Claverton Church. Unfortunately three of the bells at Claverton have developed mechanical issues, which we are having investigated in February. This has meant that there has been no ringing at Claverton since summer 2023.

The number of visiting bellringing teams at Bathampton has slowly picked up over the year, and since the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Miller Room is often used for Story Club and Children's Church and this year we have been very grateful for the heating in the Miller Room whilst we have held our services in there during the winter months.

Fabric Committee:

The Committee is responsible for the day to day upkeep of the church and churchyard and for the progress of the repairs and professional surveys listed in the Quinquennial Inspection reports. Work is carried out using in-house effort where possible but calling in contractor assistance as appropriate when funding is available.

The Fabric Committee has a team of hardworking and professional members who individually look after separate aspects of our work according to their expertise.

Planning for the next Quinquennial Inspection has started which will take place on 4th July 2024.

The biennial churchyard tree survey was reported in January 2023 with no immediate action required. The removal of seasonal leaf drop

continues to maintain the appearance of the churchyard. Tomb safety inspection remains ongoing to maintain churchyard safety. Roof gullies, hoppers and drains and ground gullies are cleared regularly to keep the church dry. Repairs and redecoration are undertaken by the team as they arise.

The church heating pipework buried under the flagstone and marble flooring was found to be badly corroded and beyond repair. PCC directed Paul Bryant to lead studies on alternative heating options.

The Fabric Committee has contributed to his studies as required. The glass doors project to improve the south entrance visual experience and disabled access remains deferred. Current thinking is that it will form part of an appeal for new church heating, electrical rewiring and redecoration.
